# **Understanding the Gospel**

<sup>36</sup>"Let all the house of Israel therefore know for certain that God has made him both Lord and Christ, this Jesus whom you crucified." <sup>37</sup>Now when they heard this they were cut to the heart, and said to Peter and the rest of the apostles, "Brothers, what shall we do?" <sup>38</sup>And Peter said to them, "Repent and be baptized every one of you in the name of Jesus Christ for the forgiveness of your sins, and you will receive the gift of the Holy Spirit."

ACTS 2:36-38

(Read also **ACTS 2:22-32.**)

When Peter preached the gospel to Jews who had gathered in Jerusalem, he did not start with good news. Peter reminded them that even though Jesus did *mighty works and wonders and signs*, He was still *crucified and killed by the hands of lawless men*. However, death could not hold Jesus, and God raised Him from the grave. Through this, He showed His power to all peoples, power even over death. By that power, He exalted Jesus at His right hand, and confirmed Him as Lord and Savior. Today, we will look at three appropriate responses to knowing and understanding the gospel.

## 1 Submit to God.

"Let all the house of Israel therefore know for certain that God has made him both Lord and Christ, this Jesus whom you crucified." ACTS 2:36

Peter's audience, from as far south as Africa and as far west as Europe, had heard of Jesus' signs, wonders, and miracles. They also knew Jesus had been crucified by the Roman soldiers, with their approval. As far as they were concerned, the story of Jesus was over and done with. However, Peter told them the plot twist: Jesus Christ had been raised from the dead, and His power was living and active in His disciples. The conclusion? He is Lord. Our response? Submit to His Lordship. What does *Lord* mean? What do you think it means to acknowledge Christ as Lord?

#### 2 Repent of sin.

<sup>37</sup>Now when they heard this they were cut to the heart, and said to Peter and the rest of the apostles, "Brothers, what shall we do?" <sup>38</sup>And Peter said to them, "Repent and be baptized every one of you in the name of Jesus Christ . . ." ACTS 2:37,38

preaching the continuation of the story—how Christ had risen from the dead to bring salvation to all, even to those who had approved
of agreed with His crucifixion. The listeners were <i>cut to the heart</i> ,
and asked, "what shall we do?" Like them, our response should be repentance—a 180-degree turn away from sin—and a decision to
follow Christ for the rest of our lives. Why is repentance necessary,
once we realize that we are sinners and we need Jesus to save us? How is baptism a reflection of this repentance?
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#### 3 Receive forgiveness.

And Peter said to them, "Repent and be baptized every one of you in the name of Jesus Christ for the forgiveness of your sins . . ." ACTS 2:38

When we submit to the Lordship of Christ, we are acknowledging

#### **APPLICATION**

- Have you put your faith in Christ for salvation? If not, would you like to do so today?
- Are you living a life that reflects how Christ saved you from your sins? How can you grow in your understanding of the gospel's power this week?
- Do you believe that Christ has forgiven you of all your sins? How will this truth affect the way you will live?

#### **PRAYER**

- Thank God for your salvation, which has been made possible through the death and resurrection of Christ. Thank Him that we can have new life in Him
- Ask God for a deeper understanding of the gospel, and for a heart that is willing to submit, repent, and live for Him everyday.
- Pray that as your relationship with Christ deepens, you would help your family and friends gain a deeper understanding of the gospel.



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
